

Message from the Provost

Dear Faculty,

This year has been particularly challenging for our students as they have struggled to pay for school expenses. We all contribute to the costs of college; our faculty, for example, contribute when you decide on course materials. As faculty, you have a key role in the selection of effective, accessible and affordable course materials.

Student success in courses is strongly related to the choice and use of course materials. UNT is committed to supporting faculty in this process.



We recently announced several initiatives to promote the use of affordable course materials. Many faculty and departments have already taken steps to provide affordable options for students, but there's still more work that can be done. With this brief note I'm encouraging you to step back and take a look at textbook costs for your courses and see if there's any action you can take to make it more affordable.

With options ranging from open educational resources (free) to negotiated price reductions with commercial publishers, there are any number of ways to address the issue. The team in my office of Curricular Innovation and Academic Partnerships is working closely with the UNT Libraries to provide resources and support. End of Year Reunion



Faculty Spotlight

Karisma Morton

<u>Dr. Karisma Morton</u>, Department of Mathematics education, was selected as a scholar member of the Institute in Critical Quantitative, Computational and Mixed Methodologies (ICQCM). She was invited to join their 2021 National Science Foundation QCM Scholars Cohort. Through her participation in this cohort, she will be among 35 early-career scholars nationwide who will be affiliated with the



During that time, she will participate in a number of professional development activities (e.g., training seminars, grant writing workshops, mentorships) designed to support scholars of color as they use, teach and critique the westernized application of quantitative, computational and mixed methodologies in research about Black, Latino/a/x and Indigenous communities. National Geographic Award Supports Citizen Science Project

ICQCM for two years.

National Geographic awarded a UNT research scientist a grant to support her work introducing middle school children to scientific research projects through citizen science.

<u>Dr. Kelly Albus</u> will lead an interdisciplinary team of faculty from <u>UNT's Advanced</u> <u>Environmental Research Institute</u> (AERI) for a project that invites teachers and students to <u>map air quality</u> in their own communities. Albus, in partnership with <u>Dr. Lu Liang</u> from the Department of Geography and <u>Dr. Sara Champlin</u> from the Mayborn School of Journalism, will utilize their expertise and a network of low-cost air quality sensors to engage classrooms across Texas in ongoing research.

Dr. Albus explained the coordinated approach by noting, "Dr. Liang is a geospatial scientist who will be heading up the air quality sensor network portion of the project, ensuring that we have high-quality data in real-time that is calibrated and ready to use. Dr. Champlin has a background in health communications research and will head up the project evaluation portion, collecting feedback and using emotion-tracking software to understand how teachers and students feel about topics such as air quality, citizen science, and the use of new technology in the classroom. With my work with citizen science groups, volunteer environmental monitoring, and teacher education, this has evolved into a really dynamic project, one that can help meet the needs of the communities we work with and also build innovative research."

The project furthers the AERI's goal of applying innovative solutions to pressing global problems through multidisciplinary collaboration.

Faculty Resource Group Spotlight: La Colectiva


Originally a network for Latina faculty, La Colectiva now includes women faculty of color, as well as allies. Its purpose is to support women holistically, emphasizing tenure and promotion, research, and teaching. A central

part of La Colectiva involves collective mentoring that draws on the experiences and wisdom of women of color scholars. La Colectiva sponsors public lectures intended to inform the broader community and supports the efforts of other mentoring groups and departments on campus.

La Colectiva's mentoring model is discussed in a book chapter in the recently published edited volume Counternarratives from Women of Color Academics: Bravery, Vulnerability, Resistance.

La Colectiva frequently sponsors guest speakers and events. They recently had Dr. Tanya Golash-Boza speak via Zoom about dis/investment and gentrification in Washington, D.C.

Open Education Resources (OER) and Curricular Innovation and Academic Partnerships (CIAP)

Are you interested in learning about an active and inclusive approach to teaching and learning? This course provides an introductory overview of HIPs along with key features of the pedagogy and actionable next steps for your teaching.

Thanks to funding from President Smatresk's Spring 2021 affordability initiatives, the UNT



Libraries, UNT Press, and the VPAA Curricular Innovation and Academic Partnerships are pleased to announce <u>three revamped programs</u> to support full-time UNT faculty, including instructors and lecturers, in adopting, adapting, and creating affordable, accessible and effective materials for use in UNT courses.

Two of these programs are related to open educational resources (OER):

 OER Summer Grants – Task payments (supplemental salary) of up to \$5,000 are available for faculty who will adopt or adapt an openly licensed textbook or other

- OER, or will adopt, adapt or create ancillary materials for an existing open textbook or other OER, during Summer 2021. **Applications are due April 1, 2021**.
- <u>UNT Open Texts</u> This collaborative effort of the UNT Press and UNT Libraries supports faculty who wish to publish an open-access textbook, with financial incentives of up to \$10,000 for proposals submitted **before September 1, 2021**.

A third program offers another approach in addressing affordability: While OER is a primary opportunity for addressing affordability, it is not an option for every course. VPAA Curricular Innovation and Academic Partnerships (CIAP) is offering task payments for faculty interested in adopting reduced-cost or curated course materials. Changing textbooks and digital materials requires a concerted effort with curricula changes and course structure revisions. CIAP will provide support resources for departments and individual instructors seeking to adopt less expensive course materials.
