About the UNT Foundation Awards

Each of the UNT Foundation Award recipients receives a commemorative award, and a bronze eagle sculpture is presented to the Eminent Faculty Award winner. Throughout the year, the bronze eagle is displayed in the honoree's department to publicly recognize the recipient's accomplishments and to acknowledge the support of fellow colleagues, administrators, students and support staff. Unlike other awards, the Eminent Faculty bronze award rotates each year from department to department as new winners are announced, creating a legacy of pride over time and across the institution.

The UNT Foundation commemorative bronze eagle was designed by Stan Briney, a local artist, retired physician and former department chair at the UNT Health Science Center. Commissioned by the Salute to Faculty Excellence committee, Briney's work captures the excellence and rich history of our institution.





Outstanding Lecturer Award

The UNT Foundation Outstanding Lecturer Award recognizes a full-time lecturer who has made significant and sustained contributions to the university as evidenced by the quality of the recipient's teaching and service.

Karen Dorff
Design

Ms. Karen Dorff is the coordinator of the Communication Design program's Graphic Design track and principal lecturer in UNT's College of Visual Arts and Design.

Ms. Dorff earned her B.F.A. in Painting and Drawing from UNT in 1985, back when it was still North Texas State University. She honed her skills as a successful designer for several large corporate firms, creating award-winning annual reports, branding and identity campaigns, editorial designs and promotional materials for such well-known clients as Dr Pepper/7-Up, JCPenney, Cigna, Motorola and Texas Instruments.

Guided by her deep industry knowledge and strong belief that design programs should prepare students to become outstanding practitioners, Ms. Dorff has dedicated her teaching career to ensuring that the Communication Design program maintains its pedagogic excellence while continually evolving to meet future industry demands. As a result, UNT's Communication Design graduates are highly sought after, not just in the North Texas region but across the nation. They've been retained by some of the most prestigious studios in the country, including Facebook, Fossil, Google, Nike, McGarrah Jessee and Starbucks Global Creative, as well as prominent local studios such as Caliber Creative, The Richards Group, Matchbox Studio and Tractorbeam.

Each year, Ms. Dorff coordinates the selection and transporting of UNT's submissions for the National Student Show & Conference, the nation's largest competition for visual communication students. Several graduates have been hired for internships and offered their first job based on projects accepted in the NSSC competition.

The Communication Design program has won the NSSC's Best School Award several times throughout her career at UNT, most recently in 2020. Ms. Dorff attributes the program's significant and sustained success to its ability to attract talented, disciplined students and accomplished educators who work in partnership toward shared goals. She considers it a rare privilege to work with such incredible students and faculty.



Community Engagement Award

The UNT Foundation Community Engagement Award recognizes a faculty member who has the sensitivity to understand and work across organizational boundaries and the leadership to build bridges among community institutions.

Suzanne M. Enck Communication Studies

Dr. Suzanne Enck is chair of the Department of Communication Studies and an associate professor of feminist rhetoric and public culture. She also serves as an affiliated faculty member of the Women's & Gender Studies program. She joined the UNT faculty in 2009.

A committed feminist scholar and pedagogue, Dr. Enck teaches courses rooted in social justice and civic engagement. She blends her scholarship and outreach at the intersections of gendered violence and women's incarceration. Her work at the nexus of gendered violence and activism has earned her the National Communication Association's Critical & Cultural Studies Division's 2016 Outstanding Scholar-Activist Award.

For nearly 30 years, Dr. Enck has volunteered with domestic violence prevention programs, rape counseling centers and university-based prevention initiatives, work that earned her a national peace award from the Sunshine Lady Foundation in 2004.

Dr. Enck is one of the founding members of the Denton Feminist & Queer Collective, a local organization aimed at engaging and activating our local community in cultural, social and political actions necessary to improve the quality of life for those who are often pushed out of political decision-making.

At UNT, Dr. Enck is active with programming and advocacy related to intersectional inclusivity, co-facilitating the student UNiTy program and serving on the CLASS Inclusive Excellence committee.

Nationally, she has served on the leadership for the NCA's Feminist and Gender Studies Division and Women's Caucus since 2006 and currently serves as part of NCA's leadership development committee, aimed at promoting practices of equity, diversity and inclusion within the national organization.



Faculty Leadership Award

The UNT Foundation Faculty Leadership Award acknowledges a faculty member who significantly impacts the academic enterprise through initiatives, leadership and service.

Corey Marks English

Dr. Corey Marks, a University Distinguished Teaching Professor, has taught poetry at the University of North Texas since 2000, and he became Director of Creative Writing for the Department of English in 2005. Dr. Marks received his bachelor's degree in English in 1992 from Kalamazoo College before moving to Warren Wilson College in North Carolina, where he graduated with a master's degree in Creative Writing two years later. In 2000, he completed his studies with a Ph.D. in Creative Writing and Literature at the University of Houston.

Dr. Marks' published books of poems include *Renunciation*, winner of the National Poetry Series Open Competition, and *The Radio Tree*, winner of the Green Rose Prize. His work has also earned him a fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Natalie Ornish Award from the Texas Institute of Letters, the Bernard F. Conners Prize from *The Paris Review* and two fellowships from UNT's Institute for the Advancement of the Arts



Eminent Faculty Award

The UNT Foundation Eminent Faculty Award recognizes a faculty member who has made outstanding and sustained contributions to scholarly-creative activity, teaching and service. The Eminent Faculty Award is one of the highest faculty achievements, and its recipient serves as an inspiration for the entire UNT community.

Alicia Re Cruz Anthropology

Dr. Alicia Re Cruz is a scholar, professor, mentor, mother of three wonderful young Latino men, wife, daughter and proud to traverse these roles "with her own accent." Much of her professional life has been colored by her efforts in creating and being part of "communities" — the survival strategy she learned in El Puente de Vallecas, the barrio where she was born and raised in Madrid, Spain.

In 1985, Dr. Re Cruz received her bachelor's degree in Geography and History, with a specialty in American Ethnology and Anthropology from the Universidad Complutense de Madrid, Spain, followed by her master's degree and Ph.D. in Anthropology from the State University of New York at Albany in 1992. That same year she became the third faculty member of the Department of Anthropology at UNT.

Dr. Re Cruz began her career working with Maya peasants in the Yucatan and the cultural transformation associated with Maya migration towards Cancún. Through this experience, she paved the way for the Department of Anthropology at UNT to develop a Latin American and migration focus. One of her major milestones as a professor was the organization of summer ethnographic field schools in Mexico, which were inspired by her pedagogical philosophy that the most meaningful learning happens when students experience different ways of thinking, living and acting in the world.

As chair of UNT's Department of Anthology, Dr. Re Cruz created several partnerships and collaborations within the university and abroad. In 2017, she was appointed the director of Women's & Gender Studies. Since then, she has co-organized the Social Justice Lab, where through shared knowledge and training, master's students in Applied Anthropology, bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. students in Behavior Analysis and master's students in Women's & Gender Studies meet, establish interdisciplinary conversations and engage in participatory research. These types of collaborations are the fuel that ignites her theoretical and applied contributions to the humanitarian global crises of displacement.

For Dr. Re Cruz, anthropology is the essential tool for social justice and equity. It is her life's work, profoundly inspired by the passion to learn from people, to work with people and to create a philosophy of "togetherness."
